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Chairperson Weatherspoon welcomed the public and called the meeting to order at 6:36 PM.

Chairperson Weatherspoon invited Ms. Morgan Vickers, Director of Special Events and Community Affairs at the Brooklyn Children's Museum, who gave a brief welcome to the museum.

Next, Chairperson Weatherspoon invited elected officials and their representatives to say a few words.

## **Elected Official Reps**

*Leanna Pierson, Chief of Staff to Stefani Zinerman:* The State Assembly is deep into session. Assemblymember Zinerman submitted 9 pieces of legislation: A package of three bills called Strengthening NY Non Profits, A7518 creating a transparency database for contracted nonprofits, A7531 creating a Nonprofit Contracting Advisory committee (nonprofits often receive lagged payments and struggle to meet their bottom lines), House New Yorkers First, and a Real Property Tax amendment on tax lien proceedings.

Ms. Pierson shared a flyer about a cannabis day of action on March 15th at 3-5 pm at Restoration Plaza. This will provide a forum for community members expressing their concern about cannabis. One of the bills the member is offering, A9316, is a Cannabis Awareness program for children 18 and under. The member is concerned about unregulated cannabis shops that sell items other than cannabis that may entice young buyers; 16 new shops have opened on Fulton St that sell convenience items like chips & sandwiches.

*Karen Chambers, Brooklyn District Attorney's Office:* Today is the late District Attorney Ken Thompson's birthday. Ms. Chambers invites members of the public to call her at the Action Center with any issues, opportunities to speak in front of groups: (718) 250-4877.

*Arlean Gillin, Director of Partnerships for Councilmember Chi Osse:* Ms. Gillin gave a rundown of the office's constituent services. On Thursdays, legal services rotate at 10AM on a variety of disciplines. Tuesdays – Housing Assistance 10-4. Next Monday the 18<sup>th</sup>, the office will serve as a hub for the Macon library's Prom Dress Drop-off, which will take place on May 4<sup>th</sup> at the library. Bring lightly used or new prom dresses starting this Monday.

The office will also partner with Transportation Alternatives for a Bedford Walk & Talk starting at Bedford & Dean at 10:15 AM, highlighting Bedford Avenue, the need for a protected bike lane.

*Camille Barbin, Constituent Services for Senator Zellnor Myrie:* Ms. Barbin gave a list of upcoming events and constituent service opportunities. Evening Hours once a week at 8PM, rotating. Please call the office for a list of services: 718-284-4700. The Predatory Marketing Bill passed this week. The Senator is organizing to keep SUNY Downstate open. Currently the office is open for constituent services by appointment only. 12-5 Wednesday for help applying through Housing Connect.

*Bianca Stevenson, office of the Brooklyn Borough President:* The State of the Borough took place last night. Borough Hall opened this week as a satellite for asylum seeker processing. Hoping to scale up to 45 asylum seekers per day. Community Board applications have closed, processing has begun. The office hopes to have info to boards by April.

Ms. Muhammad tells Ms. Stevenson she heard the Wingate concert series celebration will not take place this year. Ms. Stevenson is not sure, will follow up with the board office.

*Raul Rothblatt, District Director for Assemblymember Brian Cunningham:* As the former head of SOS Crown Heights, the member is sensitive to the number of shootings the community has

experienced recently. There have been 4 shootings in 2 weeks. The member has introduced new legislation for funding for violence interrupters, also hospital-based care and a Faith-Based Affordable Housing Act. SUNY Downstate – working full time to ensure it is funded and operational. The office offers housing support Mondays 10-3. The office will host a Town Hall this weekend (Sunday). Women’s History Month free screening of the new Shirley Chisholm documentary on the 24<sup>th</sup> at District office on Empire Ave. Call 718-771-3105 for details.

Mr. Thurton – will there be an expansion of SOS? Mr. Rothblatt responds that this bill is specifically for federal funds for violence interruption in community and hospital services.

Dr. Lazur – is New York Legal Assistance Group (NYLAG) taking place every month? Mr. Rothblatt says that it will take place in March & April for sure; it has been well utilized. Crown Heights Local Development Corporation of Crown Heights have been taking the lead. A wide swath of laws related to housing.

A community member asked “What is SOS?” Save Our Streets Crown Heights. Part of Neighbors in Action, speak with families after shootings. For example, after the recent shooting.

Having concluded elected official updates, Chairperson Weatherspoon asked for a motion to accept the minutes from the prior month. The motion is made by Mr. Mensah to accept with any necessary corrections, the motion was seconded by Mr. Staton and carried unanimously.

The Chair commenced the board’s public hearing on this month’s action items, beginning with the SLAC Committee.

### **SLA and Sidewalk Café Review Committee (SLAC)**

The SLAC Committee met on Monday, March 4, 2024 at Crown Heights Center for Nursing and Rehabilitation located at 810 St. Marks Avenue. In addition to the Chair, Irsa Weatherspoon present were: Robert Witherwax, Vice Chair, Akua Aidoo, Dian Duke, Tamika Gibbs, Jennifer Jordan, Xeerxeema Jordan, Fior Ortiz-Joyner, Robert Puca, Nicole Tetrault, Gib Veconi and Deborah Young.

The committee discussed the following new liquor license applications:

- 1. *Another Transformation LLC, d/b/a “Dilly Dally” – 626 Vanderbilt Ave (between Park and Prospect Places), Full License***
  - a. Location is the former Petite Patate*
  - b. Max Capacity: 74*
  - c. Hours of operation Monday thru Friday 5PM-11PM Monday-Friday, 11Am to 11PM Saturday and Sunday*
  - d. Outdoor space to operate weekends from 11AM-10PM and will have 12 seats*
  - e. Intend to hire locally*
  - f. Hope to participate in Vanderbilt Ave Open Streets*

The committee voted 12 in favor to support the application on the condition that the applicant provide the Board with their 500-foot benefit statement. The statement has been received, and

the benefit is listed as “a unique concept unlike those offered by other establishments in the neighborhood.” The committee hopes the full Board supports its recommendation.

Chairperson Weatherspoon asked if there were any questions from the community. The applicant is present for questions. Mr. Mensah asked, “Is the board holding this applicant to the statement they will hire locally?” Mr. Witherwax responded that typically no, we can and do ask, but it is not an enforced requirement.

A motion is made by Mr. Staton, seconded by Mr. Ross to support the committee’s recommendation. The motion passed with 23 in favor and two abstentions.

**2. Poseidon, 279 Flatbush Avenue (between St. Marks Avenue and Prospect Place), Full License**

- a. *Location is the former Kombit, and the proprietors currently own and operate Brooklyn Lunchbox Grab and Go located in Prospect Lefferts Gardens*
- b. *Max Capacity: 74*
- c. *Proposed hours of operation are 12PM-1AM Sunday, 10AM-2AM Monday thru Wednesday, 10AM-3AM Thursday thru Saturday*
- d. *Outdoor space to operate Noon to 10PM Sunday, 10 AM to 10PM Monday thru Saturday*
- e. *Intend to hire locally*
- f. *500 exception community benefit: The establishment will provide Creole / Haitian cuisine, which is unique for District 8 with only one other establishment providing Haitian cuisine (Lakou on Utica Avenue)*

*The committee voted 12 in favor to support the application with the following conditions:*

- a) *Establishment to close at 2AM Monday thru Saturday*
- b) *Outdoor spaces to close by 10 PM daily*

*The committee hopes the full Board supports its recommendation.*

The proprietor is present to answer any questions.

Chairperson Weatherspoon asked if there were any questions from the community. Hearing none, a motion is made by Mr. Veconi, seconded by Ms. Langley to support the committee’s recommendation. The motion passes with 24 in favor and one abstention.

**3. Kissa Kissa, Franklin Avenue (between St. Marks Avenue and Prospect Place), Full License**

- a. *Location is the former St. Ends bar*
- b. *Max Capacity: 30*
- c. *Hours of operation 5PM-1AM daily*
- d. *Outdoor area in rear to operate 5PM-10PM daily*
- e. *Open restaurants outdoor area in front in roadside bed, also intended for use daily from 5PM to 10PM*

The committee voted 12 in favor to support the application on the condition that the 500 foot exception benefit statement be provided to the board. The statement has been received and includes the unique concept of marrying “the rich heritage of the Japanese jazz kiss with the vibrant history of jazz in Brooklyn, particularly within the Crown Heights community.”

The committee hopes the full Board will support its recommendation.

Chairperson Weatherspoon asked if there were any questions from the community. Hearing none, a motion is made by Dr Lazur, seconded by Mr. Staton to support the committee’s recommendation. The motion passes with 24 in favor and one abstention.

The SLAC Committee meets on the First Monday of the month, next on April 1<sup>st</sup> at 810 St. Marks Avenue.

### **Public Hearing on the Agency Responses to the Capital and Expense Budget FY2025.**

The board read into the record each of the expense and capital budget requests made by Community Board 8 and the agency responses given. Below are the comments recorded at the meeting.

Ms. Neale – Every response related to seniors is a boilerplate response putting the responsibility on the Federal/State government. Chair Weatherspoon notes that Speaker Adams has much planned for seniors.

Ms. Mitchell – What is our follow-up? What do we do to hold them accountable? Chairperson Weatherspoon notes that an ad hoc budget group, comprised of Mr. Gabriel, Mr. Callahan, and Mr. Witherwax has distributed an FAQ that will help phrase budget requests and will assist in compiling responses.

District Manager George: We get lots of complaints to the office that are difficult to fit into the box of “budget request”. The form that we fill out has drop-down boxes which limit what the board is able to record.

Ms. Babel – This process seems to be about posing the right questions and then getting the response. What is unclear is – who is held accountable? DM George reminds the assembled that the Community Board is merely advisory, aggregating requests for a specific process. It is important to continue to voice concerns through all available channels.

A community member expresses concern with Capital item 19, specifically the Franklin Shuttle at Botanic Garden, which is omitted from the request. Additionally, they wish to emphasize housing for youth aging out of foster care. That station was omitted because it doesn’t fall within the boundaries of CB8.

Mr. Veconi – Capital 16 on Brower Park. The Mayor announced that they’re building 4 new skate parks, including Brower Park, which was announced only recently. Asks the EDC to come

and speak to the transportation committee. Mt Prospect will have a scoping meeting soon on their proposed skate park, coming to CB8 soon. He also notes that the response to capital item 22 on NYPD Parking is problematic, putting the responsibility for the problem in the hands of the police. Encourages people to attend the 77<sup>th</sup> precinct's community council meeting to voice concerns. On expense 33 related to new bike lanes - are we requesting protected bike lanes? Finally, on the MS 915 capital item, Mr. Veconi wants to acknowledge the work of CB8 members like Sharon Wedderburn to champion this longstanding request that requires continual community pressure.

Ms. Muhammad has concerns about protected bike lanes, and wants to make sure the community is engaged before these requests are submitted.

Dr. Lazur – Expense item 7's response, "not a budget request." Can we follow up? Adult Protective Services is often looking for reasons to exclude seniors. Is it possible to say that it is unacceptable? Chairperson Weatherspoon wants Dr. Lazur to clarify in writing, which she agrees to do.

Mr. Mensah Expense 5 & 18 – wants to further emphasize these items to ensure there is sufficient parking and reject requests to fill traffic enforcement vacancies to reduce enforcement.

Ms. Ortiz- Joyner – Capital item 14: This item has been on the list for many years and continues to be rejected.

Ms. Benn-James – Capital item 6: "Where are the existing resources that this request will be accommodated by?"

Community member Peter – for the future, can requests include an analysis, expected cost?

Pastor Neville – In favor of Expense item 16 for an increase in resources for youth crime prevention. "How can this community board assist us in obtaining resources?" Chairperson Weatherspoon replied that the Community Board's role is advisory; We can make community concerns known, but this is a multi-pronged advocacy effort.

Bill – Post-covid, there were large increases in property value. Are there resources for members of the community (grants, programs) who are long-term to remain in the community and enjoy the increase in value? Orlando Ross from Congresswoman Clarke's office responds: there are funds available through the Congresswoman's Office that interested people can call to advocate for.

Eric Purcell – Founder of Nonprofit. Kids Program Providers, wants to bring attention to his organization's work that speaks to Pastor Neville's interests.

Chairperson Weatherspoon asked if there were any questions from the community. Hearing none, a motion is made by Ms. Wedderburn, seconded by Mr. Staton to compile the comments from this evening with written comments submitted to the board as comprehensive responses to agency answers. The motion passes with 25 in favor and one opposed.

Next, Chairperson Weatherspoon requests reports from standing committees.

**Environment, Sanitation, & Transportation Committee** – Robert Witherwax, Chair

Mr. Witherwax stated that the EST Committee met jointly with the Land Use and EST Committees. He also mentioned that budget requests will be the first topic on the agenda in April. AAMUP, Daylighting. Co-Naming for Miriam Carter (Carter Cadets). No March meeting. At the February meeting, several members of EST put together a presentation. Willaim Meehan & Uma Bhandaram, public members, gave a presentation about Congestion Pricing.

After the presentation, Chairperson Weatherspoon asked if there were any questions. Mr. Staton asked about people who traverse Manhattan to get to New Jersey. Mr. Meehan clarifies that highway traffic is exempt, only surface streets are tolled. Mr. Mensah wants to know if there will be increased congestion on highway? This was studied, found negligible increases. Dr. Lazur wants to know if there will be increased injuries from increased speeds. This was also studied, actually found a decrease in fatalities. Ms. Watson – will prices be passed on? This was studied, found that in most cases this was found to be negligible. A small business working group may be created to study impact.

Peter has comments about the reduction of car lanes.

Ms. Mitchell is concerned that the MTA is the beneficiary of the funds from Congestion Pricing. Wants to know what accountability mechanisms are for the public to review how the MTA spends their money.

The EST Committee meets on the fourth Tuesday of the month, next on April 30<sup>th</sup> at 810 St. Marks Ave 6:30 PM.

**Seniors Committee** – Gail Muhammad, Chair.

The Seniors Committee met on April 6, 2024. In addition to the Chair Gail Muhammad, present were: Mildred Smith, Mary E. The committee heard a presentation from Ms. Leslie Sierra from NY Statewide Senior Action Council. Ms. Sierra provided information about Medicare and Medicaid. She emphasized the importance of reporting Medicaid and/or Medicare fraud. It was recommended that seniors

review their billing statements for accuracy. If you see the cost for services that they did not receive they must report the fraud immediately. It was also suggested that seniors pay attention to their medication received from the local pharmacy. Please be sure to count your pills. There have been reports of shortages given.

Often times seniors receive calls requesting personal information. Seniors were reminded that social security and IRS do not call individuals. If they receive these calls, they must hang up immediately.

The meeting ended with Carmen Martinez from Local Development of Crown Heights, announcing the upcoming Senior Game Day at the Crown Heights apartments. Seniors were also given information about free transport to medical appointments. The transportation program is funded by grants from Council member Crystal Hudson's office.

Lastly, Ms. Muhammad mentioned upcoming meetings, B-Luxe Blooms may come to help seniors make bouquets. She is also looking for volunteers to lead a paint & sip. The Seniors Committee meets on the first Wednesday of the month, next on April 3, 2024 at 1055 St. Johns at 6:30 PM.

Ms. Babel thanked the Community Board for its support of her business in December. She wants to bring to the Community Board's attention to the issues of small businesses. She explained that she and her twin sister opened a new business, Babel Loft which was a successor to her bar, Ode to Babel; there were several vocal members of the community who had concerns. Ms. Babel held a meeting at the 78<sup>th</sup> precinct with community members who were concerned that was recorded. Unfortunately, the building was raided in March by multiple agencies. SLA investigator, Charles Trevalis, who has a history of being untruthful in his investigations, was assigned as the investigator. The business lost its liquor license as a result of the raid. Ms. Babel states that the investigative report contains numerous untruths and came to alert the board to the issue.

Ms. Watson – new illegal cannabis shops continue to open. Wants to know if there are updates on enforcement? If there are specific locations, report to the board.

Deanna Gill. Strategic Risk Manager at DCYD. Closing out Community Moms and Dads. Flyer is available to nominate community figures who are good role models.

Sheree Parris – Introduced herself as the new president of the North Nostrand Avenue Merchant's Association (NNAMA). Hoping to improve quality of life along the Avenue. Monday night mixer at Nostrand Station. All are invited to attend.

Mr. Mensah – Gives information on black educator Dr. Oakes White, a longtime contributor to the Brooklyn Children's Museum.

Mr. Veconi – There will be an Open Streets program May 3<sup>rd</sup> to Sept 29<sup>th</sup>. Performers, instructors of programs should get in touch with PHNDC; there are honoraria for people who present programs.

Nina Babb & Eric Purcell – Kids Program Provider. Serve students, family & adults. Range of programs including arts, fitness and entrepreneurial enterprises. Summer programs, enrichment.

A Community member returns to speak about Harlem Children’s Zone, which he encourages members to research.
